

❖ **Lesson Five: the family of the prophet Muhammad (pbuh)**

➤ **Wives of the Prophet (pbuh):**

Khadijah was his first wife, she died three years before the migration of the Prophet (pbuh) to Madeenah. After her death, He (pbuh) married **Sawdah Bint Za'mah**. And then He married **Aa'isha the daughter of Abu Bakar**, may Allah be pleased with them both. She was the only virgin amongst all his wives.

After her, He (pbuh) married **Hafsah the daughter of 'Umar Ibn Al-Khattaab**, may Allah be pleased with them both. And then subsequently married **Zaynab Bint Khuzaymah**, **Umm Salamah (Hind Bint Umayyah)**, **Zaynab Bint Jahsh**, the Prophet (pbuh) married her when she was at the age of 35 years old. And **Juwayriyyah Bint Haarith**.

He (pbuh) also married **Umm Habeebah (Ramlah** and in another narration **Hind Bint Abu Sufyaan**). And after the Conquest of Khaybar, He (pbuh) Married **Safiyah Bint Huyay Ibn Al-Akhtab**, His last wife was **Maymoonah Bint Al-Haarith**, In addition to **Maria Al-Qibtiah**.

➤ **Children of the Prophet (pbuh):**

All the children of the Prophet (pbuh) were born from his wife Khadeejah, except Ibraaheem. He was born from Mariyah Al-Qibtiah;

His sons were **Al Qasim**, who lived for just few days, **At-Taaher** or **At-Tayyib**. There is a narration which said that the last two are nicknames to a son whom he named **Abdullah**. Regarding his son **Ibraaheem**, he was born in Madeenah and lived for twenty two months.

His daughters were **Zaynab** (the eldest), who married her maternal cousin **Abu Al-'Aas Ibn Ar-Rabee'**; **Ruqayyah** who married **'Uthmaan Ibn 'Affaan**; and **Fatimah** who married **'Ali Ibn Abu Taalib**. She gave birth to **Al-Hasan** and **Al-Husayn** may Allah be pleased with them both. **Umm kulthoom** was another of his daughters whom married **'Uthmaan Ibn 'Affaan**.

Imaam An-Aawawi may Allah have mercy on him, said: 'there is no doubt that the Prophet (pbuh) had four daughters and three sons according to the most authentic narrations'.
